2. Were there any changes suggested to the CORE of the TMC?

Yes – Respondents requested a History and Religion Course. One respondent wanted the TMC to have 3 Core Courses.

FDRG recommends: To keep the CORE Courses as they are.

History Courses are not common in AINA Studies and the Federal Indian Law and Policy Course is more appropriate.

Religion courses can be part of the other lists.

Having 3 CORE Courses is a lot for a new discipline in the CCC system.

3. Were there any changes suggested to the List A of the TMC?

Yes – request for Religion/Philosophy for this List

FDRG recommends: Keep it the same. Colleges can develop Religion/Philosophy courses for either List and work with their local CSU for articulation.

4. Were there any changes suggested to the List B section of the TMC? Yes – request for Pre-Columbian Art History or Anthropology, remove or edit language option, include philosophy/religion course her

FDRG recommends: Keep it the same. All questions or suggestions can be developed on local levels.

FDRG recommends: Keep the same

6. Please provide any general recommendations from the feedback received from the vetting.

- Difficulty articulating lower division courses in this major with the CSUs and UCs because there are fewer lower division courses

- Language courses in American Indian Languages
- Unhappy with creating courses that are particular for a certain area rather than just Ethnic Studies

FDRG recommends:

Keeping the same C-ID and TMC. Schools that offer AINA Language courses can work to get them approved for the language requirements and the articulation with the CSU and UC can also be worked on locally for the Colleges and regions.
